**A:** Excursion descriptions are marked with various symbols to indicate the amount and difficulty of walking, as well as occasional special-interest content. In addition, specific information about restrictions or suggested cautions is included in the tour descriptions. Once you are on board, the Destinations Manager can help you assess the suitability of a specific tour in a personal consultation.

**Q:** Can I purchase tours for both myself and my companion?

**A:** Yes, you can purchase tours online for all guests on the booking.

**Q:** What if I need to cancel my excursion?

**A:** We understand plans can change. However, last minute cancellations can result in costs to us or to our third party service providers. Cancellations of shore excursions, spa services or gift orders made more than three days prior to embarkation will be fully refunded; cancellations made onboard or within the three day window prior to embarkation may be subject to a cancellation fee. Cancellation fees for certain shore excursions may be up to one hundred percent (100%) of the shore excursion price, depending on the shore excursion. For onboard cancellations of shore excursions, please speak with the Shore Excursion department on board for the actual cancellation fee amount.

# Ketchikan, Alaska, US - Sunday, July 13, 2025:

Built out over the water and climbing weathered stairways, Ketchikan clings to the shores of Tongass Narrows and drapes the mountains with a cheerful air. Besides the main attractions - Creek Street, the Tongass Historical Museum, Totem Bight State Park and Saxman Village, try a flightseeing trip to breathtaking Misty Fjords National Monument—a transformational adventure not to be missed. These deep water fjords left by retreating glaciers left granite cliffs towering thousands of feet above the sea and countless waterfalls cascading into placid waters. The souvenir photos you'll take from the pontoons of the plane are worth the trip alone.

## Alaska Fishing & Wilderness Dining



Departs: 7:30 AM

Whether you're a skilled fisherman or a family looking for fun, this great **fishing outing** is customized for your interest and level with just six guests per boat. The light tackle used ensures an exciting and rewarding effort to bring your catch aboard.

To start your fishing adventure, gear up at the marina and board an **open-air skiff**. You'll glide into a breathtaking landscape of secluded locations, ideal for wildlife viewing and remote fishing. Spend the morning angling for numerous **bottom fish** species and whichever of the five Pacific **salmon species** are in season. Team effort brings your fish aboard. This is how you'll provide for the **gourmet wilderness meal** you're about to enjoy. Salmon, halibut, Dungeness crab, kelp greenling, pelagic rockfish and at least fifty other species are potentially on the menu today.

After catching the fish of the day, the skiff heads back to shore and you'll relax around a crackling fire in a pretty wilderness location. Settle into the stillness of the rainforest

among centuries-old spruce trees and fragrant cedars. A wilderness dining **chef artfully cooks up your catch for lunch**. Perhaps you will dine on bottom fish served atop a saffron-infused bouillabaisse or tasty salmon grilled over the fire in a method inspired by Alaska Native cuisine. Enjoy fire-warmed sourdough rolls, rhubarb-blueberry bread pudding and a steaming mug of coffee or hot chocolate. The **five-star gourmet meal** you've contributed to is a once-in-a-lifetime experience.

Return to the ship equipped with brilliant fish tales after a happy day.

**Please note:** Maximum capacity is six guests. Participants must be physically active. Terrain includes uneven surfaces. The skiff is open to the elements. Dress warmly in layered clothing with gloves, a scarf, and a hat. Rain gear, rubber boots, comfortable float jackets, wool socks, hats, gloves, fishing equipment and tackle are provided. Minimum age is 5 years. Maximum weight is 350 lbs. Not advisable for guests using a wheelchair. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. A catch is likely but is not guaranteed. The Alaska Department of Fish & Game implements conservation measures to protect king salmon; restrictions on keeping your catch may apply. Please check directly with the Alaska Department of Fish & Game

for restrictions specific to your tour date. A fishing license is required by the State of Alaska and should be purchased in advance of your tour. Children aged 15 years and younger are not required to purchase a license. All participants aged 16 and older must purchase a fishing license in advance by following these steps:

- > Under Short-Term Products, use the drop-down menu to select the Sport Fishing License for the correct term (if you will fish on multiple days, purchase a term that will cover all applicable dates)
- > Add a king salmon stamp
- > Enter the date and time you will start fishing
- > Add to your cart and check out
- > Bring the email containing your license and a screenshot as a backup

## Anan Creek Bear Viewing & Floatplane Adventure



Departs: 9:00 AM (Waitlisted)

Few natural places in North America offer the wildlife viewing opportunities found at the remote and beautiful **Anan Creek**, located in the **Tongass National Forest**. Anan is accessible only by boat or floatplane, and the wildlife observatory here is world-famous for its extraordinary wild bear-viewing opportunities. Home to one of Southeast Alaska's largest pink salmon runs, Anan attracts a significant number of bears, both black and brown (grizzly), as well as hundreds of eagles, seals and other wildlife that rely on the salmon as a major food source.

Experience the thrill of taking off from Ketchikan's waterfront by floatplane with a veteran Alaska bush pilot. From the air, you'll see Salmon Falls Resort, historic Loring (established before Ketchikan), beautiful Behm Canal and the rugged Cleveland Peninsula. This is one of the most spectacular natural wilderness areas in Southeast Alaska.

Fly deep into the vast **Tongass National Forest** to one of Alaska's premier bear-viewing areas. Access to Anan Creek is

restricted by US Forest Service Permit, so this amazing wildlife adventure is available only to a small number of privileged visitors. Upon landing, listen as a US Forest Service Park Ranger offers a safety briefing; then, your naturalist bear guide escorts you on a **half-mile hike** along an improved trail. Follow the creek to the secure bear-watching observatory overlooking a beautiful waterfall. After approximately 1 - 1.5 hours of bear viewing in the wild, return to the aircraft for the flight back to Ketchikan.

**Please note:** Guests weighing 250 lbs or more (fully clothed) pay an additional surcharge over the published fare. The surcharge must be paid directly to the tour operator just prior to the flight. Every guest is weighed at check-in. The tour operator endeavors to be discreet, but individual circumstances may not allow for complete privacy. Bags cannot be taken on the flight; a secure location is provided for storing personal items. iPads, iPad minis, tablets, drones, and selfie sticks or other extendable items are not permitted. Minimum age is 8 years. A half-mile walk is required. Terrain includes an improved trail with steep inclines. Wear sturdy non-skid walking shoes. Participants must be able to (dis)embark the aircraft and walk to the beach from floats. There is no dock at the trailhead, so you will get out of the aircraft on a rocky shoreline and with the tide level changing conditions. Participants must be able to walk and stand for two hours. Not advisable for guests using a wheelchair or for those with mobility limitations. Seating is not available during the hike. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed.

### Bering Sea Crab Fishermen's Wildlife Cruise & King Crab Snack

Wildlife is everywhere in Alaska -- crabs, eagles, whales, octopus, sea lions, porpoises, wolf eels, sharks and seals are all frequently spotted. Step aboard **the Aleutian Ballad fishing vessel** for a fascinating, educational and interactive adventure of a lifetime on calm waters. This experience is packed with stories shared by men and women who have fished the Bering Sea.

You will set out on the protected waters of Alaska's **Inside Passage**. Although the boat starred in season two of Discovery Channel's award-winning TV series *Deadliest Catch*, the waters you'll travel today are

completely different from the Bering Sea waters depicted on the show. Witness firsthand the amazing way of life of commercial fishermen, who share these waters with Alaska's maritime predators -- seals swimming about, and North American bald eagles dive-bombing the boat to catch fish. Marvel at the scenic beauty that surrounds you from the comfort of the heated and sheltered stadium-style seating lower deck or the open-air top deck.

Watch as the skilled crew haul and set long lines, barrel pots and huge 700-pound king crab pots to reveal the catch of the day. The amazing marine life is placed in an on-deck aquarium so everyone can get up close with these fantastic creatures of the sea.

As you head back to port, enjoy a **half-pound portion of the finest king crab**, served picnic style.

**Please note:** This tour does NOT go out into the rough waters of the open ocean. It remains in the calm, protected waterways of the Inside Passage surrounding Ketchikan. Dress warmly in layered clothing with gloves, a scarf, and a hat; outer layer should be windproof and waterproof. Raincoats are provided if needed. Minimum age is 5 years. Suitable for guests using a wheelchair.

### Best of Ketchikan: Totems, Wildlife Cruise & Alaska Appetizers

On this adventure, you'll experience the best of **Ketchikan by land and sea**. Enjoy three tours in one: explore Saxman Native Village, view the region's famous wildlife by boat, and savor Alaskan cuisine at a remote and historic location.

Your journey begins by motorcoach with a narrated **panoramic drive** through downtown Ketchikan. Watch for historic Creek Street -- a row of colorful shops in what was once the red-light district.

At Saxman Native Village, walk among the **world's largest collection of totems**, observe a Tlingit totem carver, and take time to visit the **village gift shop** before heading back to the bus to continue down the scenic coastal

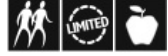
highway.

At the end of the road, enjoy the serenity of this remote location with a brief rainforest trail walk to the historic **George Inlet Cannery**. The self-paced exploration of this once-bustling maritime center includes a **feast of Alaska cuisine** and your choice of one locally **crafted beer or a glass of wine**.

The final adventure of this trio of excursions is aboard an **Alaska-built wildlife viewing boat**. While aboard, you'll explore the rugged coastline of the Tongass Narrows and glacier-carved George Inlet. There will also be an opportunity to visit Walden Rocks -- a seal haul-out and gathering place for bald eagles and a variety of marine birds. Whales, sea lions, and porpoises are frequently sighted during the cruise.

**Please note:** Dress warmly in layers with a wind- and waterproof outer layer; bring gloves, a scarf and a warm hat. Wear comfortable walking shoes. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. Participants must be able to (dis)embark the transportation at multiple venues. Walking is required. Terrain includes uneven surfaces, boardwalks, ramps, gravel paths and grass. Tour operates rain or shine but may be canceled by the operator in the event of unsuitable conditions.

### Exclusive Coastal Cruise & Oyster Farm with Ocean-to-Table Tasting

Set out on this exclusive **small-group** eco-tour adventure (maximum 12 privileged guests) to the scenic Tongass Narrows and Clover Pass - one of the most picturesque locations in Alaska. The only working oyster and kelp farm in the state is located here, serving as an invitation to tantalize your taste buds as you take in the natural wonders of the Alaska Archipelago. But you don't need to love oysters to have a great time; there is something for everyone.

A narrated **van ride** along a coastal road brings you to **Bonfire Bay**. Board a heated USCG-certified **boat** with indoor seating for a short cruise to the **Hump Island Oyster & Kelp Farm**. Keep an eye out for whales, seals, sea lions and eagles. The outside deck offers unobstructed viewing of these majestic creatures.

When you arrive, the oyster farm team provides an engaging introduction to the oyster-growing process, from the width of a thumbnail to market size. Get wet with the hands-on touch tank and watch footage from an underwater drone navigating between the oyster rafts. This behind-the-scenes look reveals the oysters' food source and the dangers within the industry.

Next, lead with your taste buds at the on-site **floating Oyster Bar**, where a **sampling of locally-harvested oyster and kelp products** is a

true ocean-to-table experience.

Finally, take the boat back to Bonfire Bay, browse in the gift shop and savor a **hearty snack** of soup, grilled or raw oysters, and chips with kelp salsa.

**Please note:** Minimum weight is 40 lbs. Wear sturdy non-skid walking shoes. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. Participants must be able to navigate multiple steps, uneven surfaces and a steep ramp.

### Exclusive Wilderness Zodiac Quest

Get behind the wheel of a **motorized Zodiac boat** and take off on an exhilarating adventure through the George Inlet Fjord.

You'll begin with a scenic **panoramic drive** through historic downtown Ketchikan, past the totems of Saxman Native Village, and along the beautiful coastline of the Tongass Narrows.

From the trailhead, walk into the rainforest to the Beaver Falls Salmon Cannery. Here, you'll don rain gear, rubber boots and a life jacket and review the safety components of the Zodiac craft. Hop into a four- or six-seater vessel and follow the lead guide caravan style, taking it in turns to drive as you steer yourself on a route tailored to the day's conditions.

This region is filled with mountainous terrain, lush forest, and pristine scenery. Your guide

will share the rich stories of the loggers from the timber years and from the nearby fishing camps. From the natural sounds of the flowing waterfalls to the hidden coves, keep your eyes open for active wildlife, including bald eagles, harbor seals, Sitka black-tail deer, black bears, and salmon streams. Routes may vary upon the tide levels but can include a zip up to the mouth of Mahoney Glacial Cirque, Mahoney Asche Mine, Coon Cove, and White River Cove.

After cruising for 90 minutes, return to the cannery for a flight of locally-crafted beers, hot drinks and a snack of cheese and reindeer sausage before returning to the ship.

**Please note:** Minimum age is 6 years. Minimum weight is 40 lbs; maximum weight is 300 lbs. Minimum height is 42". Minimum age to drive is 25 years with a valid driver's license. All eligible participants will have a chance to drive. Parties of fewer than three will share a boat. Route may change due to tide and weather. Minimum age to drink alcohol is 21 years. The boats are not wheelchair accessible. Ride will be bumpy; guests who are pregnant and those with a back or neck condition are not allowed to participate.

A **De Havilland Beaver floatplane** aircraft roars to life, and you take off from the water with an individual headset and a guaranteed window seat. Glide over the **Tongass Narrows**, viewing bustling communities and Southeast Alaska's sprawling wilderness below.

Watch for remote indigenous communities, abandoned mining towns, high alpine lakes, breathtaking snowcapped mountains, the lush green Tongass National Forest, and the beautiful blue water of the Inside Passage.

The tour operator has an exclusive right to land at **Salmon Falls Resort** beside the tranquil waters of Clover Pass Inlet. Here, you'll step inside the lodge for a warm welcome. Photograph the famous waterfall, savor a **delicious meal** in the *Timbers* dining room with a salad, salmon lox crostini, local seafood including Dungeness crab cake, salmon and halibut, and an Alaskan beer or wine of your choice. Berry cobbler with streusel topping provides the perfect conclusion.

A beautiful 25-minute **coastal drive** provides a glimpse into Ketchikan's vibrant waterfront community as you return to the ship by road.

### Historic Wilderness Flightseeing by Seaplane

This flight aboard an **authentic Alaska seaplane** – a **de Havilland Beaver or Otter** – is a mesmerizing experience, offering spectacular views of Southeast Alaska from a

window seat. The rugged coastline, pristine fjords, and majestic mountains will unfold beneath you, creating a cinematic panorama of nature's grandeur.

Enjoy your pilot's narration with individual headsets as you soar over the historic downtown Ketchikan and waterfront community, the Tongass Narrows and Guard Island's colorful homes, and remote cabins.

Fly along Behm Canal and Back Island -- home to a US Navy nuclear acoustic measurement testing facility. Learn about the area's history while flying over historic Loring, first settled in 1883. It once boasted an operating salt factory but is now a ghost town.

Watch for Clover Pass Resort, Knudsen Cove, the Hump Island Oyster Farm and Salmon Falls Resort. View Escape Point, where Captain George Vancouver and the Native Americans once skirmished, and Traitor's Cove.

Head north over Neets Bay Salmon Hatchery -- a popular bear-viewing site -- and past glacier-carved canals, pristine mountain peaks, and silt-laden aqua waters. See Helm Bay, a former gold mine site, cascading waterfalls, jewel-like lakes, spruce, hemlock, cedar forests, and snowcapped peaks.

**Please note:** Guests weighing 250 lbs or more (fully clothed) pay an additional surcharge of \$168. The surcharge must be paid directly to the tour operator just prior to the flight. Every guest is weighed at check-in. The tour operator endeavors to be discreet, but

This short, fascinating walking tour starts when you meet your guide of Tlingit descent, who shares personal knowledge of the many changes Ketchikan has undergone in the past decade and in earlier history.

**Stroll** along Ketchikan's famous **Creek Street**, with its wooden boardwalks that hug the shoreline lined with vibrant shops and historic buildings. This area is the former red-light district, and you'll learn of its important economic role in the city's early history. Along the way, you'll discover the story behind the many **totems** that line the streets and more about the historic Married Man's Trail.

Your guide will also tell you about the

incredible journey salmon undertake as they return upstream and over hundreds of natural and manmade obstacles to their spawning ground.

Enjoy the many trees, shrubbery and flowers along the route and learn of their importance to the Tlingit Natives' food-gathering practices.

Questions are encouraged -- bring your enquiring mind -- as your guide has a profound understanding of the community and its culture.

**Please note:** The walk is approximately nine blocks, with periods of standing along the way. Wear comfortable walking shoes. Dress warmly in layered clothing with gloves, a scarf, and a hat; outer layer should be windproof and waterproof.

Rev things up a notch as you slide behind the wheel of a **Utility Terrain Vehicle** on this wilderness safari that is ideal for the whole family.

Take the scenic route by van as you transfer to the White River base camp. Your driver shares entertaining stories of Ketchikan, including the history of the Ward Cove Pulp Mill and the town's logging days. Your guide covers driving instructions and assists you in gearing up for the adventure.

The trail is UTV trail is five miles each way, so grab your muddy buddy, settle into your UTV and head out to get dirty. You'll follow the leader in single-file formation up and down the mountainside. Explore the mountainous trails of the George Inlet Fjords and the hidden beauty of the Tongass National Forest en route to Mahoney Lake.

The path has several stops along the way to pause and ponder the magnificent scenery and wildlife. Take photos and take turns driving. This remote location is perfect for adventure-seekers and those wishing to go off the beaten path.

Lunch is an outdoorsy no-fuss affair with a smokin' wild game link sausage served on a warm bun and a cup of simmering chili. Sweeten up with a cup of hot chocolate afterward.

Be greeted by Tlingit native people, then stand on the spot where the United States took possession of Alaska in 1867 for \$7.2 million, less than two cents per acre. The dramatic setting in the shadow of Mt. Edgecumbe is one of the loveliest in the Great Land. Take a stroll through old growth forest in Sitka National Historical Park, shop the downtown district, and poke around the Sheldon Jackson Museum for a close-up look at some of the city's most prized arts, crafts and Russian relics.

Return to the ship with brilliant fish tales to share.

## All About Sitka: Russian & Tlingit Heritage Discovery

Charming **Sitka** boasts an endearing heritage stemming from its 10,000-year history as the home of the Tlingit people, its colorful past as a Russian settlement, and its place as an American pioneer town. This is the rich cultural environment you'll discover today.

A brief ride by motorcoach brings you to **Sitka National Historical Park** -- Alaska's oldest National Park, established in 1910. The park offers numerous scenic paths. Follow your guide along a beach trail lined with totems -- stately reminders of Native traditions and the values of tribal culture. A short, optional walk along the spruce-lined

paths is a chance to learn about the area's edible and medicinal plants, rainforest ecology, and the many uses of salmon. At the park's Visitor Center, you'll see crafts created by local artists, ancient artifacts, and a video presentation.

Travel to the Tlingit village area in the heart of downtown Sitka. Step inside a **modern clan-style house** called Sheet'ka Kwaán Naa Kahídi. This translates as "the Community House for All the People of Sitka." The two large panels at the entrance represent the iconic symbols of the eagle and raven. Gather around a central fire pit, where drums, swirling robes, and traditional Tlingit stories and songs inspire, revitalize, restore and preserve the language, values and customs of the Native people.

A **panoramic drive** showcases the beautifully restored Russian Bishop's House, which dates back to 1858, and tiny-mighty St Michael's Russian Orthodox Cathedral, originally constructed in 1848 to house a priceless collection of Orthodox art and religious artifacts dating back to the 15th century.

The Fort Ray Historic District was the site of headquarters for Sitka's World War II harbor defenses and the adjacent Naval Air Station. Although the fort was never completed, it evokes an era when Alaska was believed to be a prime target for Japanese attacks.

You can take a self-guided tour of St Michael's Cathedral at your leisure. Guests wishing to stay in town to shop or explore independently are welcome to do so but must make their own way back to the ship.

**Please note:** Terrain includes paved and gravel paths. Dress warmly in layered clothing outer layer should be windproof and waterproof. Wear comfortable walking shoes.

### Explore Sitka, Raptor Center & Native Tales

Discover the **Alaska Raptor Center**, staffed mostly by volunteers who rescue these birds of prey, provide rehabilitative care for them, and hopefully release them back into the wild. See the fascinating bird-on-a-glove presentation and photograph the birds throughout the grounds.

Wander along lush forest paths at **Sitka National Historical Park**. On the beach trail, totems depict the rich culture of the Southeast Alaska Native people. Learn about medicinal

plants, the various salmon species, and rainforest ecology. At the **Visitor Center**, meet Native artists and view a fascinating audio-visual on Sitka's history.

Sitka's **Naa Kahídi Community House** features the largest carved Native house screen in the Pacific Northwest. Admire beautiful traditional clothing and learn to speak a bit of Tlingit before you leave.

Guests wishing to stay in town to shop or explore independently are welcome to do so but must make their own way back to the ship. You may choose to visit St Michael's Cathedral -- the first Russian Orthodox cathedral in America -- to view its priceless icons and religious artifacts.

The lead guide machine is operated by a local US Coast Guard-certified leader. You'll practice in the protected bay until all guests are comfortable; then, head toward the protected waters of **Silver Bay**, skirting in and out of smaller bays, in between islands, and along the beaches of Sitka Sound. The captain pauses the group to talk about local marine life, flora and fauna, as well as local history and culture. You'll ride for approximately 1.25 hours.

Back at the start point, gather your belongings and transfer back to the pier or to the downtown area. Guests wishing to stay in

town to shop or explore independently are welcome to do so but must make their own way back to the ship.

After boarding a day-boat directly from the ship, you'll relax in the warm, comfortable cabin, surrounded by large windows, as the naturalist and crew orient you to the stunning scenery and prolific wildlife. You'll cruise near the rocky shoreline and weave through a maze of icebergs that have fallen from the face of the glacier -- the perspective from the smaller vessel is astounding.

Ice conditions permitting, the captain will navigate the narrow cut between Haenke Island and the mainland en route to the Hubbard Glacier. Offering a variety of

viewing angles for photos and video, this "river of ice" is often very active, calving icebergs with an almighty crash. Unlike many other glaciers, Hubbard Glacier is advancing. At times, this advance has been up to 7 feet a day, earning it the nickname, "the Galloping Glacier."

The vessel is specially designed for navigating this silt-laden river, which is the only access to this remote, roadless portion of the preserve. No other tour ventures into this same territory. The boats are not enclosed, allowing you to view and photograph the majestic scenery and wildlife in an unhindered fashion.

Eagles, moose, and bears are quite often the highlight of the river tour, making for wonderful photo opportunities. The scenery alone is worth the trip, with cascading, hanging glaciers and surrounding 6,000-foot mountain peaks -- this is the real, untouched beauty of Alaska.

Back on land, join the skipper, crew and staff

for a meal in a covered, heated pavilion or around a **crackling campfire**.

Reboard the bus and retrace your route on the scenic ride back to the ship. You'll leave the Bald Eagle Preserve with a myriad of amazing memories and a new appreciation for Alaska and those who call it home.

**Please note:** Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. Dress warmly in layered clothing with gloves, a scarf, and a hat; outer layer should be windproof and waterproof. Warm outerwear is provided.

## Chilkat Valley Scenic Drive: A Small-Group Experience

The charming town of **Haines** (2,500 residents) is located on a peninsula where two glacier-fed rivers -- the Chilkat and Chilkoot - meet the sea. Haines nestles between a snowy mountain range and the two rivers, staking its claim to one of the most dramatic scenic backdrops in the State of Alaska.

On this 2.25-hour small-group outing, set out on a short **drive through historic Fort Seward**. From **Pyramid Island Lookout**, you'll view the wide river delta, where the braided Chilkat River drops tons of glacial silt into the ocean every day.

Continue along the edge of the salt water to the **Letnikof Cove Cannery Lookout**. Here, the Rainbow Glacier and Chilkat Mountains provide a stunning backdrop to the red buildings of this historic salmon cannery.

Then, you'll retrace your steps back through downtown Haines and travel to the mouth of the Chilkoot River. The road winds along the salt water. Keep an eye out for birds such as surf scoters and marine mammals such as harbor seals.

Where the Chilkoot River flows into the sea, discover a peaceful kaleidoscope of river, ocean, mountain and forest habitats, both interdependent and firmly delineated. Bald eagles are often spotted here, wheeling above or calling to each other from the spruce trees.

Finally, you'll return to Haines with a stop at Picture Point to photograph your ship with the iconic white buildings of Historic Fort Seward in the foreground and the gleaming Chilkat Mountain as the backdrop.

After a riverside **picnic**, you will board an 18-foot inflatable **raft** and enjoy a **peaceful float** (no white water) down this ever-changing river. 7,000-foot peaks tower above you as you float through the preserve.

This is an unforgettable adventure into the grandeur of Alaska.

**Please note:** Minimum age is 7 years. Minimum weight is 50 lbs; maximum weight is 350 lbs. Not advisable for guests using a wheelchair. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. Bring an extra pair of socks. Dress warmly in layered clothing with gloves, a scarf, and a hat; outer layer should be windproof and waterproof.

### Fast Ferry to Skagway On Your Own

This **transfer by ferry to Skagway** may suit you if you would like to **explore on your own**.

It consists of a 45-minute breathtakingly beautiful ferry ride down Lynn Canal -- a fjord that connects the two northernmost towns of the Inside Passage.

Upon arrival in Skagway, it is a short walk into this town known for its gold rush-era buildings, now preserved as part of the Klondike Gold Rush National Historical Park. You will have approximately four hours in Skagway to shop and explore independently.

**Please note:** Participants must walk approximately 100 feet from the cruise terminal to the ferry dock. Not advisable for guests using a wheelchair or for those with mobility limitations. Motorized scooters and electric wheelchairs cannot be accommodated aboard the ferry. Terrain includes a marine ramp from the pier to the boat, which can be very steep at low tide. Guide service, taxi transfers, entrance fees and lunch are not included in the transfer price. Your ferry ticket does not include the White Pass & Yukon Route Scenic Railway. A water bottle is provided and is available for purchase as a souvenir. Helmet use and waiver are required. Minimum height is 4 feet. Minimum age is 10 years. Maximum weight is 300 lbs. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed.

### Haines Bike, Hike & Brew

You'll come to a crescent of gravel beach -- a great place to spot seals, sea lions, whales and many types of birds.

Hike back to your bike for a ride along the waterfront to **Picture Point**. As the name implies, there's a great photo-op of your ship.

Back in town, you'll stop at the **Haines Brewing Company** to sample **locally-brewed beers** (root beer and tea are also available).

Picture Point, as the name implies, is the perfect spot from which to admire and photograph the town of Haines and your ship.

The **American Bald Eagle Foundation's Raptor Center** has been training and caring for rehabilitated raptors (birds of prey) for more than 30 years. This interpretive wildlife education center offers a wealth of Alaskan natural history displays and information. Expert handlers and naturalists have known these beautiful birds for many years and are eager to share their knowledge and experience with you.

Heading north of town along Lutak Inlet, spot numerous glaciers, towering peaks, rivers, and the sea all converging to create amazing scenery. Venture into the **Chilkoot River corridor**, home to a large population of bears

and other wildlife gathering to feast on the buffet of sockeye salmon returning to spawn in the river and Chilkoot Lake. Watch for the fish weir where the Alaska Department of Fish & Game counts each salmon that runs upstream. Your guide will explain the importance of this system, and you'll see the current season's count. Pause on the beach at scenic Chilkoot Lake to take photos and enjoy a delicious sample of locally-caught seafood, fresh sourdough bread, and homemade cookies. Sweeping mountain and glacier panoramas surround you.

**Please note:** Transportation is by basic school bus. Waiver must be signed, and medical conditions disclosed. Dress warmly in layered clothing with gloves, a scarf, and a hat; outer layer should be windproof and waterproof.

### Nature & Wildlife Expedition

Composition tips, camera settings and how to take advantage of available light are discussed, along with some interesting advice on how to predict wildlife behavior. Tour departure times -- early in the morning or later in the afternoon -- are timed to maximize wildlife viewing and take advantage of low-angle light for the best photographs.

Bald eagles are commonly seen and, depending on the time of year, brown bears might be seen feeding on salmon spawning in the Chilkoot River. The small-group nature of this outing allows the guide to spend time with each guest, making the most of your photo experience.

Visit the production area and barrel room to see and learn about the distillation process, hear stories about the distillery's connections to Haines culture and maritime industry, and try a tour-exclusive **sample of Wrackline Rye Whiskey straight from the barrel**.

Dive deeper into the Haines experience with a sensory exploration and tasting of the distillery's **six handcrafted Brightwork Bitters**. You'll also learn how herbal and floral tinctures incorporate Alaskan plants that you can see, smell, and taste. When and how these are added to spirits affects the outcome. Enjoy craft spirits in tasting flights or handcrafted cocktails made with fresh syrups and juices. Ask questions and shop for bottles and merchandise to take home.

Guests wishing to stay at Fort Seward to explore independently are welcome to do so but must make their own way back to the ship (two blocks downhill).

**Please note:** Tour includes a cocktail or five-spirit tasting flight, souvenir shot glass, a taste of rye whiskey from the barrel, tasting samples of six handcrafted bitters, and 10% off store merchandise. Participants can

purchase one additional drink in the tasting room during or after the tour. Minimum age is 21 years. Tour does not operate on Sundays.

### Rock Climbing Adventure

There are great climbs for all abilities, and no prior experience is necessary -- perfect for those looking for their first climbing experience or experienced climbers looking for a challenge.

Your tour begins with a short interpretative drive through the town and along the **Chilkat River Valley**. From the highway, you'll **hike uphill** for about 15 minutes. At the base of majestic rock cliffs overlooking the scenic Chilkat Valley and surrounding peaks, don rock-climbing shoes, a helmet and a harness.

Listen to a safety briefing and a basic introduction to climbing. Then, rope up and start climbing, with a series of rock routes to choose from. Some climbs are very easy; others offer more of a challenge. Each climb ends with a stunning view of the Chilkat River and the surrounding wilderness. Many of the professional mountain guides have guided on peak ascents in Alaska and around the world. They enjoy sharing their stories of adventures in the mountains. Participants will have the chance to climb three or four different routes, time permitting.

Afterward, everyone will enjoy the cliffside **snack** with hot cocoa and stunning views.

As you venture on, take advantage of magnificent photo opportunities, including crystal-clear mountain streams, a cascading waterfall, a scenic alpine lake and, hopefully, the occasional eagle or bear.

At a sub-alpine meadow, you will encounter a panoramic view of Lynn Canal, Chilkoot Lake and the many snow-capped mountains that make Alaska so famous.

Take time at the exclusive **Takshanuk mountaintop lodge** to enjoy a warm fire, stunning views and a home-cooked halibut and chicken **lunch** made just for you.

After you've relaxed by the fire, return to Haines on the Takshanuk Trail bus with a **panoramic drive** through Fort William H. Seward en route back to the ship.

**Please note:** Driving the machines is based on availability; guides do their utmost to ensure individuals who would like to drive have the opportunity to do so. Minimum age to drive is 21 years; bring your driver's license. Guests who are pregnant or have a heart, back, neck or other condition should consult with their

Transfer to Letnikof Cove and step into a Zodiac for a 10- to 20-minute ride across the bay to Glacier Point. After a wet landing in ankle-deep water (rubber boots provided), put on your hiking boots and follow your local guide through the temperate Alaska rain forest. The Expedition Team and a local specialist guide will interpret the variety of fauna and flora you see along the way. Before long, you'll find yourself at the base of Davidson Glacier. Your hike culminates with splendid views of the glacier as you enjoy your lunch.

Please note: Melt and rain conditions may impact how far the hike can progress especially as conditions become slippery. Minimum age is 8 years. Maximum weight is 300 lbs (136 kg). Tour duration may vary

depending on group ability. This is a very beautiful but strenuous hike and requires endurance and flexibility, and should only be attempted only by those who are prepared for hours of walking on primitive game trails. The hike is mostly on unimproved trail and includes elevation gains and losses, some boardwalk and some stream crossings. The final approach toward the glacier is over braided plain with boulders and loose rocks and may vary depending on the melt water conditions. Not suitable for guests with hip or knee conditions. Total distance covered is 5 miles (8 km) and the elevation gain is approximately 328 feet (100m.) Approximate walking time is three hours but may vary depending on group ability. Bring bottled water from the ship. Bring an extra pair of thick socks. Trekking poles and a snack lunch are provided. Shoe size(s) must be supplied so that rubber boots can be provided for the wet landing at Glacier Point. Please advise any special dietary requirements. Tour departs from and returns to the ship. Dress warmly in layers with a wind- and waterproof outer layer; bring gloves, a scarf and a warm hat. Bring a backpack to stow any layers you shed. Wear sturdy non-skid walking shoes. Wear sunglasses and biodegradable sunscreen; bring insect repellent. Bring binoculars. There are steps to negotiate when (dis)embarking the Zodiac, with assistance offered. Tour generally operates rain or shine but may be canceled in the event of extremely bad weather or unsuitable conditions. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed.

Join this spectacular hiking adventure that immerses you in the remote beauty of Southeast Alaska where you will be surrounded with amazing mountain, glacier, and ocean views. At the start of your tour you will be greeted by your professional hiking guide for a remote hike out on the Chilkat Inlet. We will drive for about 30 minutes along the Haines Peninsula to Chilkat State Park. Once at the trailhead, the hike is over rolling terrain on primarily unimproved trail through temperate rainforest. The hike gains and loses elevation and may be slippery at times especially in rain. Your knowledgeable, naturalist guide will talk about the flora and fauna of the region as we make our way towards Moose Meadows. Once we have made our way through the forest towards the coast, finally we step out onto the beach, where we are treated with magnificent glacier views across the fjord. The total hiking distance is about 3-5 miles depending on the group and weather

conditions. The trail is out and back, so depending on the pace of the group, we may continue south along the coast of the peninsula. We will stop along the way for a light picnic lunch with a fantastic view. After lunch, we will return back through Moose Meadows and make our way back to the pier in Haines. The tour duration may vary depending on group ability.

Please Note: The trail rises about 100 feet total in elevation and may be strenuous especially when conditions are wet, muddy and slippery. This tour operates weather permitting although rain does not deter us. Daily Temperatures can vary so we recommend bringing warm layers and a waterproof jacket, waterproof pants and sturdy hiking shoes to make the experience as enjoyable as possible. Bring a hat, sunglasses, sunscreen and binoculars, as well as a backpack and suitable protection for your camera. Minimum age is 6 years old. Guests under 18 must be accompanied by an adult. Bug spray and walking sticks are highly recommended.

### White Pass Summit Scenic Railway in Skagway

Ride in a comfortable vintage or replica car to the summit of the White Pass, through two tunnels, over trestles, and through remote valleys. Pass Bridal Veil Falls, Inspiration Point and Dead Horse Gulch as your guide announces all the points of interest and tells the story of the Klondike Gold Rush.

At the White Pass summit at 2,865 feet, travel around the summit loop allowing everyone to experience the excellent views during this 2.75-hour rail journey.

This narrow-gauge railroad is an **International Historic Civil Engineering Landmark**. It shares this honor with the Panama Canal, the Eiffel Tower and the Statue of Liberty and is truly a world wonder.

**Please note:** The return time to Haines will be advised on board. Your tour includes a **boxed lunch** and transfers to and from the train. Restrooms are located on each train car. You will not get off the train during the tour. Terrain includes a marine ramp from the pier to the boat, which can be very steep at low tide. Not advisable for guests using a wheelchair.

### Wilderness UTV Adventure

Drive a Razor-style **UTV (utility terrain vehicle)** into the Alaskan wilderness. Scenic mountain and river views with wildlife viewing opportunities abound.

Your knowledgeable guide will meet you at the dock in Haines. A scenic 26-mile drive by passenger van or school bus along the National Scenic Byway and through the **Chilkat Bald Eagle Preserve** brings you to the remote staging area.

Listen to an orientation and safety briefing about your Razor-style UTV (Razor style means side-by-side). These high-performance UTVs are fun to drive and a great way to explore the Alaska wilderness.

Over the next 15 miles of **gravel road**, your guide will lead you through a series of remote areas to explore the wilds of Alaska. As you drive past beaver ponds and mountain meadows, keep an eye out for swans, salmon, eagles, bears or moose along the way.

Cross over Little Salmon Creek and ascend to a series of viewpoints overlooking the Klehini, Tsirku and Chilkat River Valleys. From this vantage point, enjoy a **picnic lunch** and bask in the surrounding mountain views.

Descend the mountain and make your way back to the staging area before returning by van or school bus to Haines.

**Please note:** Minimum age is 8 years. Minimum height is 4'10". Minimum weight is 50 lbs; maximum weight is 300 lbs. Minimum age to drive is 21 years with a valid driver's license. There is a combination of 2-person and 4-person machines to accommodate varying group sizes and families. There are several spots along the route to swap drivers, giving everyone some time at the wheel. The UTVs are automatic transmission and drive similar to a car for ease of operation. Wear closed-toe shoes (mandatory). Dress warmly in layers. Restrooms are not available during the wilderness ride. Picnic-style lunch includes a sandwich, chips and cookies, along with water, lemonade, hot cocoa and coffee.

## **CANCELLATIONS**

Cancellations of shore excursions, spa services or gift orders made more than three days prior to embarkation will be fully refunded; cancellations made on board or within the three-day window prior to embarkation may be subject to a cancellation fee. Cancellation fees for certain shore excursions may be up to one hundred percent (100%) of the shore excursion price, depending on the shore excursion. For onboard cancellations of shore excursions, please speak with the Destinations department on board for the actual cancellation fee amount. Cancellations of spa services within twenty-four hours of the appointment are subject to a fifty percent (50%) cancellation fee. All cancellations made on board will be refunded in the form of onboard credit, regardless of whether the purchase was made by a guest or a third party.
